The Theme of Loyalty and Betrayal in A. S. Pushkin's Novel "Eugene Onegin"

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Abstract. This article examines the theme of loyalty and infidelity in A.S. Pushkin's novel "Eugene Onegin." The image of Lensky is also associated with the theme of fidelity. He truly loves Olga and is true to his romantic ideals, which makes him a tragic character. His death is the result of betrayal both on the part of Onegin and on the part of Olga.
